CHAO'S PREFERENCE FOR KENTUCKY

SUMMARY: In August of 2018, Transportation Secretary Elaine Chao (2017 to present) <u>touted</u> her work to bring federal dollars back to Kentucky, stating: "I try not to come empty handed." Chao's record helps make her point. Under her leadership, the U.S Department of Transportation (DOT) put a major maritime office in Paducah, KY, town of about 25,000 residents. They've also spent significantly more money on Kentucky-based contractors and projects compared to previous years.

National Map Of Maritime Gateway Offices:





As Transportation Secretary, Chao Spent More On KY Than Predecessors

OVERALL NUMBERS

Under Chao, More DOT Money Was Allocated To Kentucky-Based Contractors Than Before She Took Office. The value of contracts going to Kentucky contractors jumped more than 421 percent during Chao's first year as Secretary of Transportation compared to the year before Chao took over. By 2018, the value of contracts paid to Kentucky based contractors had jumped twelve times, a 1,262 percent increase compared to the final year before Chao took over. 

Under Chao, More DOT Money Was Allocated To Contracts Performed Within Kentucky Than Before She Took Office. In 2018, the Department of Transportation spent nearly \$14 million on projects located in Kentucky. This is an over \$11 million increase from the final year of the Obama Administration, and more than \$3 million more than any other point in the last decade. \$67.5 Million Grant In Florence, KY
